ofi Atta Annan, the seventh Secretary-General of the United Nations, Nobel Peace Prize Laureate, and founding chair of the Kofi Annan Foundation. exemplified visionary and principled leadership over the course of his life and career. Of his numerous accomplishments was the establishment of the Global Fund for AIDS. Tuberculosis, and Malaria (The Global Fund), which changed the approach to preventing and managing infectious diseases and the practice of public health globally. Visionary and principled leadership is critical for Africa to implement a new public health order that will enhance the timely detection and effective response to public health threats. and to ensure Africa has a healthy and productive population. It is also critical for mitigating the economic and social effects of these health threats while contributing to sustainable achievement of Africa's Agenda 2063 and the Sustainable **Development Goals.**

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

My role in the development of Nigeria's the National Action Plan for Antimicrobial resistance. Specifically, leading production of the multisectoral national AMR Situation Analysis (2023) and the Surveillance Pillars for animal & environmental health.

My Leadership Challenge Project is about... Public Health leadership at the subnational level is essential for providing an enabling environment for frontline one health workers. My challenge is to build leadership capacity in subnational animal health leaders in Nigeria to support animal health systems strengthening and national health security. This will be achieved by rolling out ISAVET Veterinary Field Epidemiology Training Programme for Executives, building on a successful pilot in 2023.





Dr Rose Wafula

Medical doctor, Public Health Practitioner who is passionate about robust sustainable systems for population health especially for women, adolescents and children. I have over 18 years' experience in health with substantial experience in developing (formulation, designs and planning), implementing, monitoring of public health programs. I am currently a Deputy Director of Medical Services and Head of the National AIDS and STI Control Program in the Ministry of Health. In previous roles, I have been charged with leading Gender Based Violence Prevention and response within the Ministry of Health including during the COVID-19 crisis. I also previously served as the program manager for the elimination of mother to child transmission of HIV in Kenya.

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

> My Leadership Challenge Project is about...

The greatest achievement is the reduction of mother to child transmission rates for HIV by 50% between 2013 and 2016 in Kenya.

There are 1,322,702 PLHIV on daily ART across 3,571 health facilities, 90% receiving care in Primary Care level facilities (2.3 and 4) in Kenva, About 70% of the PLHIV on treatment are older than 35 years and their needs include care for noncommunicable diseases. Reproductive health and mental health support. The current HIV service delivery operates as vertical independent HIV clinics which results in high costs, parallel services, and gaps in quality of care. The isolation and labeling of stand-alone HIV clinics exacerbates stigma. Moreover, the evolving financial landscape underscore the need for efficiency gains and leverage for better outcomes. My project focuses on improving the quality of care for PLHIV through redesigning the HIV service delivery model to align with universal health coverage (UHC) reform agenda in Kenva and aimed at providing access to integrated, peoplecentered HIV services. At least 100 standalone HIV clinics at PHC level should be integrated into outpatient care or converted into chromic care clinics by end of the fellowship. This will be achieved through applying my coordination role in development of relevant policy tools and guidelines for HIV service integration into PHC





Dr André Rose

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Public Health Medicine Physician with an interest in population health, radiation safety, occupational health, transdisciplinary research, the intersection of art and health, and the plight of marginal communities. I have facilitated complex engagements with multiple stakeholders at national and provincial health departments, academic institutions, global agencies, civil societies, and local communities. I am dedicated to mentoring the next generation of African public health leaders and scientists. I am an artist and use my artistic expression as an advocacy voice to narrate and comment on challenging contemporary social issues.

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date? During the COVID-19 pandemic I lead the vaccination rollout in the Northern Cape (NC) province in South Africa. This task allowed me to bring decisive leadership in an intricately complex environment. The NC is a geographically and ethnically diverse area offering multi-layered public health challenges. Under my leadership I improved vaccination coverage and strengthened the health system.

My Leadership Challenge Project is about...

SAPRIN is a national Research Infrastructure (RI) of Health and Demographic Surveillance Systems bringing together seven regional nodes. The aim of my challenge is to develop the 2025-2030 strategic plan for SAPRIN. The plan aims to develop SAPRIN's vision, mission, values, and value proposition. The importance of building strong science RI networks within Africa is paramount to moving the Continent forward as a science powerhouse. The success of SAPRIN can be a blueprint for developing similar RI networks across Africa. The value of RIs is that they reduce research costs, facilitate interdisciplinary research, and promote cross pollination of research ideas (within Africa).

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Dr Adilson De Pina

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

> My Leadership Challenge Project is about...

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Specialist in Public Health, Monitoring and Evaluation for 13 years, leading the Malaria Elimination Program in Cabo Verde, supported by the Global Fund under the Ministry of Health, and supporting the HIV and TB program. For the past 5 years, I have focused on the Leadership development of Public Health leaders in Cabo Verde, working with the Universities, teaching Master courses in different areas of Health and leading research projects in the National Institute of Public Health. With extensive experience at national and international levels, I have collaborated with countries such as Guinea Bissau, São Tomé and Príncipe, Ghana, Senegal and others, implementing HIV, TB and malaria Programs and participating in numerous international events, representing Cabo Verde.

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

Currently, I serve as the coordinator of international Policies, Regulations and Global Health Security within the Ministry of Health in Tanzania. Over the past 10 years, I have worked at both Subnational and National levels in the Health Sector, demonstrating leadership and coordination skills at both Regional and Global levels through organizing and managing meetings, conferences and workshops. Through this project I will be able to; Conduct leadership Assessment among Region Health Management Team (RHMT) in the selected regions, designing mechanism to address the identified gaps from the conducted assessment and Communication Enhancement, improve communication channels between leaders and their teams

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

> My Leadership Challenge Project is about...

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passionate public policy practitioner with a particular interest in public health. My work experience spans over 26 years all of which have been in the public sector. Currently responsible for coordinating development of health policies, planning and financing as well as health partnerships and resource mobilisation for strengthened health systems. I am a believer in lifelong learning and have keen interest in tackling development challenges for sustainable solutions that are centered in systems thinking approaches.

I have lead a team of professionals that included, technical officers and legal advisors to work on and negotiate an Agreement to resolve an issue on a potential collaboration for a health facility project that would provide access to quality health services to a rural population of more than 3 000 people. The Agreement took almost 2 years before it could be signed to facilitate design the facility as phase 1 of the project. Presently, Phase 2 (construction) Agreement is being finalised for signing anticipated by August 2024 after which construction will start.

Harnessing and leveraging on the leadership, strengths and skills that exist within the local communities to solve health challenges. It is based on a small village in the northern part of Botswana, with a population of about 1 400. It seeks to identify the assets within the community by employing the Asset Based Community Development (ABCD) approach to public health challenges and in the process come up with interventions that could help to improve the community or individual's ability to achieve and maintain good health and well-being.

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

> My Leadership Challenge Project is about...

I am currently the Director of the Health Emergency Operations Centre at the Ministry of Health and Social Action in Senegal. I participated in the training of trainers for the 2023 COUS in the Seychelles with support from Africa CDC and WHO. I am the deputy coordinator of the SURGE team in my country.

I am particularly proud to have contributed to the institutionalisation of decentralised emergency management with the creation of regional epidemiological surveillance and emergency management offices during the reform that led to the creation of regional health departments.

My main challenge is to strengthen the territorialisation of emergency management with functional regional councils, effective EIR in each region and emergency funds for rapid and effective action at all levels.

What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

> My Leadership Challenge Project is about...

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public health physician and epidemiologist and Associate Professor of Epidemiology. I teach courses to field C epidemiologists (FETP) and public health specialists. For the past 15 years. I have been and continue to be the National Focal Point for the International Health Regulations, providing leadership and coordinating public health emergencies, health monitoring for diseases with epidemic potential and strengthening cross-border surveillance, while reporting to the WHO and other technical and financial partners. I am also a member of the "One Health" platform responsible for preventing, detecting and responding to public health emergencies, and work with Africa CDC, which makes me one of the pioneers of Event Based Surveillance in Africa, Finally, when it comes to managing points of entry (cross-border surveillance), the CDC/Atlanta enables me to think about and respond to cross-border challenges that are common to our continent.

My great pride lies in the production of normative documents relating to the signing of the decree on the creation and allocation of entry points to Côte d'Ivoire with several stakeholders. I'm also involved in drafting the Public Health Emergency Response Plan for the airport, port and land borders, within a multi-sectoral framework. From February 2016 to the present, I have been involved in coordinating activities at the Public Health Emergency Operations Centre (COUSP) relating to the management of Covid-19, Dengue, Yellow Fever and other public health emergencies occurring in Côte d'Ivoire. Since 2018, I have been coordinating resource mapping (Remap) as part of the IHR and the drafting of the National Health Security Action Plan (PANSS).

The problem of the increase in public road accidents in an African conurbation undergoing rapid economic and demographic expansion: the case of the city of Abidjan. The implementation of this ambitious project will make it possible to reduce the number of road accidents, which are a real public health problem in our regions, with their attendant social, psychological, economic and health consequences. What is the single most leadership achievement your most proud of to date?

My greatest prid is to have contributed to the establihment and operationalization of the Public Healh Emergency Operations Center (PHEOC) at the central and decentralized level (Region and health district) in my country, the PHEOC constitutes the coordinating body for all public health emergencies in the Republic of Guinea.

Leadership, management and coordination (LMC) are essential to the success of any public health project or program. The challenge I am setting myself is to facilitate the leadership development of 48 public health leaders in the coordination bodies of the central and decentralized level (Region and prefecture) of the EPI in my country by 2025. The objective is to contribute to improving routine EPI vaccination coverage to at least 67% by the end of 2025 through a more local and specific CML approach.

I had the privilege of working in the national program for control and elimination of schistosomiasis and geohelminthiasis as assistant to the coordinator. I played a pivotal role in organizing the 2023 South African Diabetes Summit. resulting in actionable policy recommendations to advance diabetes prevention and care. My interest lies in addressing non-communicable diseases (NCDs) and diabetes across Africa, Fluent in French and English, I have been recognized as a World Heart Federation Salim Yusuf Emerging Leader, and I am a member of the WHO **Global Diabetes Compact Forum.**

My proudest achievement is the establishment of South Africa's first exclusive Diabetes Research Centre at the University of Pretoria. As a co-founder, I played a pivotal role in creating a centre dedicated to advancing diabetes research and care. The centre has become a hub for transdisciplinary research, capacity building, and community outreach, significantly impacting diabetes management and prevention in South Africa.

My project aims to tackle Africa's growing burden of NCDs, injuries, and mental health issues by establishing the Pan-African Collaboration Network for NCDs, Injuries, and Mental Health Research (PANCO.Net). This digital platform will serve as a central hub for researchers to share data, insights, and best practices. In addition to the platform, annual conferences and workshops will be organized to provide spaces for African researchers to develop innovative research projects and policy recommendations tailored to the specific needs of African communities, thereby promoting cooperation and knowledge exchange. This initiative will foster crosscultural collaboration by engaging academic institutions and governmental bodies, ultimately enhancing the capacity for effective research and policy development across the continent.

My leadership challenge project proposes to address Africa's high suicide rates by developing a training manual for religious leaders in mental health and suicide prevention. The project aims to equip these trusted community figures with basic skills to identify at-risk individuals, provide initial support, and make appropriate referrals. By integrating religious leaders into suicide prevention strategies, the project seeks to expand the reach of mental health services, reduce stigma, and create a more culturally relevant and accessible approach to addressing the suicide crisis in Africa.

It is a leading organization that is promoting open conversations about mental illness in Nigeria, with plans to extend to other African Countries in due course.

Africa's population is predominantly youthful, and their mental health challenges require urgent attention. My project involves training at least 100 university students across 4 selected tertiary institutions in Nigeria that will culminate in the establishment of a student club in each school. These students will be trained in the basics of mental health, psychological first aid, mental health advocacy as well as leadership skills to transform them into mental health champions in their schools. The goal is to have these student champions promote mental wellness, encourage other students to avoid drug abuse, provide peer to peer support etc.

This endeavour included refurbishing the national psychiatric hospital, eliminating patient chaining, raising awareness of mental health issues, and developing human resources dedicated to mental health

Stigma, discrimination, and limited resources are significant barriers to accessing mental health care in developing countries, including Sierra Leone, creating a huge treatment gap. Addressing these attributable factors requires effective leadership. My project is to reduce mental health stigma and improve access to care in Sierra Leone. This will be accomplished through a comprehensive and multi-faceted approach encompassing public health awareness campaigns, community-based programs, training and capacity building of 50 mental health professionals and community health workers through the WHO mhGAP. Furthermore, partnerships and collaborations with relevant stakeholders will be formed to facilitate the integration of mental health care into primary health care and disease programs like HIV/AIDS and TB.





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
