Strengthening Border Health to Enhance Regional Security in East Africa


Over the last decade, Uganda's borders have faced outbreaks like Ebola, COVID-19 and cholera. Amid an ongoing mpox outbreak, the country is enhancing border health efforts, screening over 1,2 million travellers monthly.

From 19 to 22 May 2025, 40 health officers from 24 border posts attended a four-day training in Kampala. Led by the Ministry of Health, it aimed to strengthen response capabilities.

The officers learned to map population movement, assess health risks, detect outbreaks, and use a new digital screening tool. They also honed their skills in cross-border coordination and community engagement, which is especially important at informal crossings where communities and travellers mix.

A highlight of the training was a new digital reporting tool, already used in Rwanda, which Uganda will test at selected points of entry. This tool will help streamline surveillance and speed up responses across borders.

The Elegu point of entry, on the Uganda-South Sudan border, was highlighted as a success story. Despite limited resources, the border post screens over 3,000 people daily. Patrick Lamot, Cross-Border Coordinator at Elegu, shared how the team utilises a WhatsApp group to enhance coordination and has established strong partnerships across borders to manage health risks effectively.



Fast-Tracking Mpox Vaccination to Protect Children

Children are among those affected by the current mpox outbreak, but before they can be included in vaccination programmes, countries must expand emergency use authorisation to cover them. This has been done in the DRC, with Uganda following suit. While Uganda can vaccinate children aged 12 and above, the DRC has begun vaccinating children under 12 with the LC16 vaccine from Japan.

Strengthening Health Systems to Eliminate NTDs Across Africa

African Union Member States and partners have joined forces to eliminate Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) by 2030. During the week, over 50 African countries gathered with support from Africa CDC, The END Fund, WHO and other partners. The focus of the meeting was to strengthen national plans to combat NTDs and mobilise resources to address the diseases, which include Guinea worm, Kala-azar, sleeping sickness and elephantiasis.

The initiative aims to improve access to healthcare, ensure equity and build stronger, more resilient health systems across the continent. Through these collaborative efforts, the goal is to make significant strides towards eliminating NTDs and improving public health for millions of people in Africa.
