Africa CDC Drives Continental Strategy for Pandemic Readiness

Africa CDC convened top negotiators from across the continent in Addis Ababa to review the continental position on Pathogen Access and Benefit-Sharing (PABS). This follows the adoption of the Pandemic Accord by WHO Member States at the 78th World Health Assembly in May.

Last week's meeting resulted in bold priorities and a unified strategy that puts Africa in a leading role - ensuring fair access to health tools, in addition to promoting technology transfer as well as strengthening emergency preparedness for all. The Pandemic Accord came in the wake of COVID-19, which exposed major gaps and inequalities in how countries responded to the crisis. In response, WHO's 194 Member States agreed to develop a global agreement to strengthen pandemic prevention, preparedness and response. The aim is to ensure that all communities and sectors - both nationally and globally - are better equipped and treated more fairly when facing future pandemics.

Forging Africa's Path to Health Independence



Achieving health sovereignty is essential to building a safer, stronger Africa, said Dr Jean Kaseya. In an interview with Executive Forecast, he emphasised the continent's urgent need to secure equitable access to vaccines, medicines and diagnostics.

He called for greater investment in systems that are locally led and owned — including expanding manufacturing capacity, strengthening primary health care, developing digital public health infrastructure and ensuring rapid response to

outbreaks. Dr Kaseya also outlined how Africa CDC is actively translating this vision into action.

He suggested that recent cuts in global health funding could serve as a turning point. Africa CDC is using this moment to promote sustainable health financing — driving domestic investment, tapping into innovative funding sources, and building resilient systems for the continent's future.


Weekly real-time insights on public health threats across the continent
