Historic First as Ethiopia Rolls Out R21 Malaria Vaccine

Ethiopia has made history, becoming the first country to launch the R21/Matrix-M malaria vaccine, delivered alongside insecticide-treated nets to protect children in 58 high-burden districts.

With 186,000 doses ready for rollout, this integrated approach provides double protection against one of Africa's deadliest diseases.

Africa CDC congratulates Ethiopia for its leadership and partnership - bringing us one step closer to a continent free of malaria.

The R21/Matrix-M malaria vaccine, developed by the University of Oxford in partnership with the Serum Institute of India and Novavax, demonstrated up to 77% efficacy in clinical trials published in 2021 and was endorsed by the World Health Organization in 2023 for use in children under three - marking a major advancement in global malaria prevention efforts.












Stopping Malaria's Resurgence: A Call to Action



Malaria is resurging across Africa - but this crisis is avoidable. In 2023, the continent accounted for 95% of global malaria deaths, with alarming surges in countries such as Zimbabwe and Botswana, signalling the disease's spread into new regions.

This is a critical turning point. Without urgent and coordinated action, decades of hard-won progress risk being reversed.

In a recent BMJ opinion piece co-authored with colleagues from Africa CDC, Dr Jean Kaseya outlines what Africa - and the global community - must do to halt malaria's resurgence and safeguard the future of public health on the continent.


Weekly real-time insights on public health threats across the continent


Focusing on moderate to very high-risk events, the report tracks a range of threats-from emerging infectious dis-

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Strengthening Ebola Response in Bulape, DRC



In Bulape, located in the Kasai province of the Democratic Republic of Congo, the response to the Ebola outbreak is being reinforced. Africa CDC is supporting national health authorities to enhance surveillance, contact tracing, and data management - protecting communities and working to end the outbreak.

The outbreak was officially declared on 4 September 2025, marking the DRC's 16th

Ebola Virus Disease outbreak to date. It was confirmed following laboratory testing of samples from suspected cases, including health workers and close contacts of a 34-year-old pregnant woman who died after presenting symptoms consistent with Ebola.

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Building Lab Leadership for a Stronger Africa



In partnership with the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA), Africa CDC is equipping laboratory professionals across the continent with essential leadership and management skills to strengthen disease surveillance, enhance outbreak response, and advance the New Public Health Order.

In Lusaka, 34 lab professionals from 15 African Union Member States received training under the Laboratory Leadership Programme, marking a significant step toward a more resilient and responsive public health workforce.

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
